Note: Answer <u>any one question from each stage from the respective course.</u> Each question carries 10 marks. (Max.Marks-20)

MENHC 1.1: Course –I: English Literature from Chaucer to Milton

STAGE-I

- 1. Examine the representation of Christian and pastoral values in Milton's Lycidas.
- 2. Attempt a comparative study of Satan and Beelzebub in *Paradise Lost- Book-I*.

STAGE-II

- 1. Discuss Andrew Marvel's attitude to love and death in "Thoughts in a Garden".
- 2. Comment on the theme of morality and justice in *Volpone*.

MENHC 1.2: Course – II: Shakespeare

STAGE-I

- 1. Discuss the different images of "kingship" as explored in *Richard II*.
- 2. Comment on the political relevance of Shakespeare's England in *Julius Caesar*.

STAGE-II

- 1. Discuss the importance of religion in *Measure for Measure*.
- 2. How does Shakespeare idealize pastoral life in As You Like It?

MENHC 1.3: Course–III: Restoration and 18th Century English Literature STAGE-I

- 1. "Gray's Elegy is the epitome of rustic, pastoral quality of man". Discuss.
- 2. "Moll Flanders is the most remarkable example of true realism". Substantiate.

STAGE-II

- 1. Examine Man-Woman relationship in *The Way of the World*.
- 2. Consider Sheridan's *The School for Scandal* as a sentimental comedy.

MENHC 1.4: Course – IV: Shakespearean Sonnets and Criticism STAGE-I

- 1. Critically evaluate any four of Shakespearean sonnets prescribed for study.
- 2. Comment on A.C.Bradley's contribution to Shakespearean criticism.

STAGE-II

- 1. Critically examine Wilson Knight's "On the Principles of Shakespeare Interpretation".
- 2. Attempt a critique of Johnson's Preface to Shakespeare.

MENH-1.5: Course – V: Comparative Drama-I

STAGE-I

- 1. "King Oedipus and Agamemnon are Victims of fate". Discuss
- 2. Consider Euripides' Medea as a tragedy of revenge.

STAGE-II

- 1. Discuss the conflict between reason and instinct in *Phaedra*.
- 2. Comment on the Organ Tartuffe relationship in *Tartuffe*.
