Each part will have five units each, for a total often units. Ten multiple choice questions will be asked from each of the ten units for a total of 100 questions.

* * Analytical Reasoning unit will follow the model of UGC NET test syllabus. Students can use the model questions provided in NET syllabus for what might

be asked in this section.

* * Reading Comprehension section will consist of selected passages from both theoretical readings and historical scholarship. Students will be tested on their ability to understand different types of readings and answer given questions.
